What is my 4-year plan?



3. Be thinking ahead of what colleges you may want to attend. They may have a higher admission requirement than the Davis School District graduation requirement.
4. Talk to your counselor about your plan.
5. Talk to your parents about how you will finance your college costs.
6. Starting a file for all awards, honors, paid and volunteer work, and extra curricular activities.
7. Read books.


What are the questions I should be asking myself as I come up with my career plan?


Build great study habits this year. Great study habits are the foundation of future success.


If you are earning A's and B's in your core classes, consider challenging yourself by taking an Honors level class. There are also great stepping stones to AP courses as well as college preparation.



Start building your college transcript by taking CE classes! CE classes are college classes taught in high school. In order to earn the college credit, students must apply to the university offering the credit, pay the application fee (usually around \$30-\$40), and pay \$5 per credit hour. REMEMBER: it is important to pass these classes because it is permanently on your college transcript!

CE: Concurrent Enrollment

Costs about \$40.00 registration fee and \$15.00 per class
Enrolled in high school and college class at the same time.



Work hard in class all year and learn the material.



Earn a grade for the class that goes on high school and college transcript.



AP: Advanced Placement

Costs about \$90.00 per class

Work hard in class all year and learn the material.



Take the GIANT AP TEST in May.



Pass the test and earn credit for the class.



These classes are college level courses that require students to fully commit to that level of learning. Expect to put a lot in, but the skills and experience you receive will benefit you in many areas of your life.

Registration Checklist:

Registration form completed and turned into the Counseling Center by Thursday, February 7th.

On my registration:

- English
- Math
- Geography or AP Human Geography
- Science
- PE (1.5 P.E. credit required between 9th and 12th grade)
- Art—Any fine arts taken in 9th grade goes towards graduation requirements

If I signed up for Honors:

1. Signed honors description/application form.
2. Circled the correct honors courses on my registration form.

If I was invited to take a reading class, it is in my schedule.

Make sure you have signed up for at least four alternate classes.

Computer literacy is a foundational element of success in today's technology driven world. There are five different classes that you can choose from to satisfy this requirement to graduate from high school.

World Languages

It is a great idea to learn another language. It helps you communicate with others, get a job and get paid more in a job. We strongly recommend this. At MJH, we offer Spanish.

The University of Utah requires two years of a foreign language. You can take it in 7th and 8th grade to meet this requirement.

The Regents' Scholarship requires two years of a foreign language in 9th-12th grades.
